

You can scarcely believe what you see on TV and other electronic media: human body parts lying everywhere, little children lying dead beside their parents. People driven from their communities, their homes, schools and churches burned, their bodies maimed and dismembered. Savage attacks that do not spare women or children, the very young or the very old. People rounded up and shot, whole families and communities buried alive. What is going on? What is their offense, what is their crime? They are Christians! In an Islamic Republic this is what Christians deserve. 'Death to the Infidel' the Islamic fanatics scream and those Muslims who aren't fanatics generally give their silent accent, for they know that all these things must happen in order to establish an Islamic World Wide kingdom. When you see what's happening in Iraq anger and anguish are natural results and the cry rises from every heart still beating, WHY? Why so many martyrs? Why does God allow it? Why so much silence from the media? Why so much apathy in the West? Why so much bitter hatred from the East? Why is there no outcry from the other nations on earth? Why so much hatred against Christians? Every false allegiance is opposed to the Truth of Jesus' Lordship.

The killing continues at the rate of approximately 160,000 Martyrs a year in places like Algeria, Nigeria, Sudan, India, Pakistan, Iran, and Iraq, China, and Korea, to name just a few. If the recent history of the last few centuries doesn't chill your blood, then reading FOX'S Book of Martyrs will. Human nature is a nasty depraved thing indeed, we are taught to confess in our Catechism that sin makes us inclined to hate God and our neighbor. Merely human hatred explains a lot of the atrocities and tragedies in this world. But is there more going on here? When Christ ascended the Devil was cast out of heaven for the last time, he fell to the earth and is filled with fury against Christ and all His followers, Christians. We do well to look for the demonic denominator in all Christian Martyrdoms. We read in Paul's letter to the church of Ephesus: "*Finally, be strong in the Lord and in the strength of His might. Put on the whole armor of God, that you may be able to stand against the schemes of the Devil. For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers over this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places*" (Eph. 6:10-12). In other words, the devil is behind the hatred. But God has His Own purpose. Jesus said, "*Truly, truly, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Whoever loves his life loses it, and whoever hates his life in this world will keep it for eternal life. If anyone serves Me, he must follow Me; and where I am, there will my servant be also. If anyone serves Me, the Father will honor him*" (John 12:24-26). Glory comes through sacrifice, and the blood of the Martyrs is the seed of the church. May God give all of us the willingness to lay down our lives in the service of Christ!

Elder Gene and Pastor Joel Vander Kooi were our delegates to Synod Visalia in June, and when he was asked what it was like to be there in person, Pastor Vander Kooi answered with the following:

Warmth of Fellowship! It is warm in Visalia, California during the month of June. Average Temperature while we were there? 92 in the shade, but it felt good after an unusually cold winter in Iowa. The weather wasn't the only thing that was warm; so was the fellowship. As you see brothers arrive from Coast to Coast USA and others from Canadian Provinces in the far North you can scarcely believe it's true. All these acquaintances, all these people from your past, all these wonderful brothers in the Lord; and some sisters too, as several delegates take their wives along at every Synod.


Life in the Spirit! It doesn't rain in Visalia for five months in a row (May – September). No worries - they have mountain run off filling their irrigation canals. God provides in winter all the water they will need all summer. The Christian also lives in a dry and weary land. But the Psalmist reminds us that, *"There is a river whose streams make glad the city of God"* (Psalm 46:4). That river is the Holy Spirit. As delegates meet to do the business of Christ's church we are especially aware that we are in the world but not of the world. That is, we didn't come from the world and we are not sustained by the world. The church in the world finds its source sustenance and refreshment out of this world. The church is the product of the Holy Spirit and the church is constantly refreshed by the Holy Spirit. The Spirit's refreshing is poured out through the reading of God's Word in Synod Devotions, the singing of songs lead by talented organists, the tenor of dialogue and debate on the Synod floor. It is Life in the Spirit, a truly wonderful thing to observe and be a part of.

Promise of Plenty! As you drive through the countryside around Visalia, you cannot help but be impressed by the variety of agricultural products growing the fields, orchards, and vineyards all around: oranges, grapefruits, lemons and limes; almonds, walnuts and olives; peaches, apricots, and grapes; tomatoes, beans, sweet corn and field corn, (yes field corn!) but not nearly as much as Iowa. In fact, the greater Visalia area boasts that it produces no less than 250 agricultural products, many of them dairy based as it is one of the largest milk producing counties in the world. It is truly a land flowing with milk and honey! It reminds us of Ps. 67:5-7: *"Let the peoples praise You, O God; let all the peoples praise you! The earth has yielded its increase; God, our God, shall bless us. God shall bless us; let all the ends of the earth fear Him!"* God has also richly blessed the United Reformed Churches, we experience it in our worship, we experience it in our unity with fellow churches and federations, we experience it in outreach.



Perseverance Rewarded! A truly unique part of Synod 2014 included a day trip to Sequoia National Park. These Giants of the Forest have reached ages over 3,000 years. They reach heights of nearly 300 feet, that's as tall as a 31 storey building. Standing next to something that tall and that old has a way of putting your life into perspective. *"What is man that You are mindful of him, and the son of man that You care for him?"* (Ps. 8:4). But God in Christ does!







Peaches and Cream Cheesecake Bars
Cherie

- 1 cup finely chopped almonds
- 1 cup graham cracker crumbs
- 1/3 cup butter, softened
- 2 8 oz pkg cream cheese, softened
- 1 can sweetened condensed milk (14 oz)
- 2 lg eggs
- 1/4 cup lemon juice
- 1/2 tsp almond extract
- 2 1/2 tbsp flour
- 1 can drained sliced peaches (8.75 oz)
- pinch of salt

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Spray 9x13 pan. In mixing bowl combine almonds, graham cracker crumbs, and butter with fork until combined. Press into bottom of pan. Using mixer, beat cream cheese until smooth. While mixing, add sweetened condensed milk, eggs, lemon juice, almond extract and flour. Mix until fully combined. Pour over crust. Puree peaches in blender. Stir in salt. Using a tbsp, drop spoonfuls of peach puree over top of cream cheese mixture. Using knife, gently swirl peaches through filling to create marbled look. Bake for 30 minutes or until center is set. Remove from oven and cool to room temp before transferring to refrigerator to chill throughout. Cut and serve chilled.

Double Cheese Delight **Sarita**

- 4 oz uncooked medium noodles
- 1 lb hamburger
- 1/3 cup chopped onion
- 1 tbsp chopped celery
- 1 8 oz can tomato sauce
- 1 tsp salt
- 1/2 cup creamed cottage cheese
- 3 oz pkg cream cheese, softened
- 1/4 cup sour cream
- 1 medium tomato

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Cook noodles as directed; drain. In large skillet, cook and stir meat, onion and celery until meat is brown and onion is tender. Drain off fat. Stir in tomato sauce and salt. Heat to boiling; reduce heat and simmer 1 minute. Remove from heat. Stir in cottage cheese, cream cheese, sour cream and noodles. Pour into ungreased 1 1/2 qt casserole. Slice tomato; arrange on top. Cover, bake 30 minutes. 4 servings.

Apple Salad **Sarita**

- 2-3 cups apple
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 1 cup dried cranberries or grapes, halved
- 1/3 cup or more of sunflower seeds

Dressing:

- 1/3 cup mayonnaise or plain yogurt
- 1 tsp lemon juice
- 2 tbsp sugar
- 1/4 - 1/2 tsp cinnamon

Mix together and refrigerate for 1/2 hour or more. I usually sprinkle a little lemon juice on the apples while chopping to prevent them from becoming brown.

S'mores Bars **Cindy**

- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup butter, softened
- 2 tsp vanilla
- 3 cups flour
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp salt
- 2 (5 3/4 oz) package chocolate stars or kisses
- 13 oz jar marshmallow crème

In a large bowl, combine sugar, eggs, butter and vanilla. Blend in flour, baking powder and salt. Stir until thoroughly combined. Spread half of mixture in greased 9x13 inch pan. Press chocolate kisses or stars, point down, into dough. Spread with marshmallow creme. Crumble remaining cookie dough over filling, smoothing slightly. Bake at 350 degrees for 30-35 minutes or until bars are golden brown. Cool and cut into squares.




