A case to appreciate the Holy Spirit



The religious world we live in today is largely dominated by Pentecostal denominations that seem to expand both in terms of geography, and local influence. Those churches have a great amount of focus on the work of the Holy Spirit both in terms of extraordinary gifts; healing, speaking in tongues, and seeing visions; along with the ordinary gifts of faith, repentance, and lives of holiness. With the growth of such a worldwide focus on the work of the Holy Spirit one would expect to see deep theological development of the Holy Spirit as Pentecostalism expands. However, that theological development seems to be lacking. As J. I. Packer suggests in his book called *"Knowing God,"* "The person and work of Christ have been, and remain, subjects of constant debate within the church; yet the person and work of the Holy Spirit are largely ignored. The doctrine of the Holy Spirit is the Cinderella

of Christian doctrines. Comparatively few seem to be interested in it." Therefore, some consideration of the ongoing work of the Holy Spirit would be helpful for us to undertake, and would be beneficial especially as Pentecostalism continues to grow and influence us.

One must ask what the proper work of the Holy Spirit is, where he comes from and how important his work is. When considering the unique work of the Holy Spirit one finds the confessions to be a great asset as they help to direct our consideration. The Heidelberg Catechism says that we cannot do good works without being born again by the Spirit of God (Lord's Day 3), and that the Holy Spirit is given to God's people "so that, by true faith, he makes [the believer] share in Christ and all his blessings, comforts [him or her] and remains with [him or her] forever." (Lord's Day 20) We also know in the very popular Lord's Day 1 that "Christ, by his Holy Spirit, assures me of eternal life and makes we whole-heartedly willing and ready from now on to live for him." So we can conclude that the work of the Holy Spirit is very influential in our salvation, and can even say that his work is necessary since without him we would not be made willing and ready to live for Christ, nor would we be made partakers of Christ and his blessings, and therefore we could not be saved without him.

We have a tendency not to pay particular attention to the Holy Spirit since he is like an electrician working a spotlight in a theater. The one who works the light does not draw attention on himself; rather he casts light on the actor who is performing on the stage so that the audience can see, and understand the plot. The Holy Spirit does that type of work as he illuminates Christ's ministry by teaching God's people about Christ just as Jesus promised when he said, *"The Helper, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, he will teach you all things and bring to your remembrance all that I have said to you."* (John 14:26) That illumination is what the Holy Spirit would do for the Apostles, and what he continues to do for all God's people as the Holy Spirit points to, and bears testimony of Christ's work.

So one could say that the Holy Spirit is the person of the Trinity who continually draws attention from himself by placing that attention on another. He does that by pointing to Jesus Christ, and applying Christ's saving work to his people. The Spirit then is instrumental in the salvation of God's people, since without him they would not know Jesus, nor would they have faith in him. Furthermore without the Spirit the saving work of Christ would not be applied to all those who are chosen to believe. We know that since *"In [Jesus] we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of his grace, which he lavished upon us, in all wisdom and insight making known to us the mystery of his will, according to his purpose, which he set forth in Christ as a plan for the fullness of time, to unite all things to him, things in heaven and things on earth" and " But if Christ is in you, although the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ Jesus from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies through his spirit who dwells in you." (Ephesians 1:7-10; Romans 8:10-11) So we see clearly from those texts that the Holy Spirit is necessary and instrumental in our salvation as his work is to reveal, teach, and apply Christ's redemption to sinners.*

The Holy Spirit's work is done like that of a contractor. The Spirit does not go and do whatever he wants when he wants, but our Lord Jesus Christ sends the Spirit. That is clear from Jesus' promise to send the Spirit in texts like John 14:26, and the Pentecost account given in Acts 2 and following. In Acts 2 specifically the apostles and witnesses where experiencing the work of the Spirit directly as they heard a sound like a mighty rushing wind, and they saw divided tongues as of fire that appeared and came to rest on each of the apostles; yet in Peter's sermons he does not preach about the Holy Spirit, and explain the mechanics of speaking in tongues to the crowd. No, Peter preached about Christ crucified with a call to *"repent and be baptized... in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit."* That text then is not primarily about the work of the Holy Spirit, but about Christ who has kept his promise by sending the gift of the Holy Spirit to the Apostles so that he would be a blessing to all people.

This work of the Holy Spirit is not to be misunderstood as being a work separated and secluded from the redemptive work of Christ. There can be a temptation to separate the Holy Spirit's inspiration, or gifts, as being separate manifestations that are permitted to disagree with scripture, or with what we know of Christ's teaching. We could spend an exorbitant amount of time on this aspect of the Spirit being misunderstood and misapplied; however a simple reference to Jonathan Edwards' work called "Religious Affections" will have to do as we remember that visions, fervor for God, increased love for God and neighbor, and other affections can be faked by the devil. However, a true sign of the Spirit's work is an increased love for God in his beauty and perfection. This love is not selfish or self interested, however it stems from a knowledge and conviction that God is Holy, righteous, and majestic which then brings a worshiper to his or her knees in faithful, thoughtful worship. The correctly applied and understood work of the Holy Spirit agrees with scripture, testifies to Christ, and applies the redemptive work of Christ to the believer. He does that in a way that cannot be faked, manipulated, interrupted, or hindered by the devil, the world, or our sinful flesh. In God's grace he softens our stubborn, sinful wills, and protects us from all threats as the Holy Spirit regenerates the believer which leads to faith, repentance, justification, sanctification, perseverance, and glorification. All of that he does by grace, despite our sin, despite our misery, so that God would have the glory, and pleasure in saving sinners.

Make no mistake that without the Holy Spirit there would be no gospel, no true faith, and therefore no one who is saved from their sins. Without the Holy Spirit the gospel writers would not have understood Christ, would not have had inspiration, and would not have written the gospels. Without the Holy Spirit there would be no gift of salvation given to people, and there would be no way then for the blessings won for us in Christ to be applied to us. Without the Spirit's work there would be no salvation.

As we have considered one of the marginalized persons of the Trinity we realize that he is very beneficial to us, and that without him we would have no knowledge of our sinful, miserable state; we would not have knowledge of Christ and no gift of the gospel; and we would not have Christ's saving work applied to us. As we consider this we also realize that the work of the Holy Spirit can be misunderstood, misapplied and that if we do not know the Spirit and his work we can easily be fooled by the devil who lies to us, and tempts us to stray from our calling as Christians. What we find though is that our God has planned for the attacks of the devil, and has once again defeated the devil as the Holy Spirit effects true faith in each of God's sons and daughters, which affects their lives forever.

What we also find is that there is a rich heritage of teaching concerning the work of the Holy Spirit that has been done for us in our confessions, keeping us from misunderstanding and being confused concerning his work and his sender. We realize quickly that the Holy Spirit is not merely a promise, but is a promise that is fulfilled as he has been poured out on the church, and continues to work wonders in God's people. We perceive him all around us, working in our loved ones as they confess faith and grow in righteousness. Our Reformed heritage is a great blessing as we confess what we do concerning the Holy Spirit, our own salvation, and the ongoing work of our ascended Lord Jesus Christ as he continues to gather unto himself a people of every nation, tribe, people, and language.

Therefore we give him honor, and praise God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit for their work in our redemption. We praise the Spirit for his ongoing work in our lives as he continues to build us up in the faith, and make us not only willing, but also ready to live henceforth unto Christ. We realize that he is also behind our public professions of faith as he works in us the will to profess our faith publicly, the ability to profess it, and by his grace the desire to live a life of gratitude—even if that life is full of inconsistencies, and fraught with stumbling—despite our original, our active, and our passive disobedience.

As we go forward into a season when we have a special service for Pentecost, and as we witness public professions of faith, we can do so rejoicing in God's application of his plan of salvation for sinners. We go forward knowing whom the Spirit is, what he does, and give God the praise and the glory for his great redemptive work we continually witness within God's people, and ourselves.

Craig was born on March 5, 1968 in Sioux Center, IA. He was the oldest son and second child born to Gary and Sandra. He was blessed with the wonderful privilege of being born and raised in a Christian home. He attended Sioux Center Christian School for grades k-8 and Unity Christian School for grades 9-12. The faith of his parents became that of his own and he made profession of faith when he was in high school. When he graduated from high school he chose Dordt College to be the place to receive his B.A. degree.

Karen was born on January 5, 1968 in Bellingham, WA. She was the oldest daughter and second child born to Hans and Bev. She was blessed with the wonderful privilege of being raised in a Christian home. She attended Lynden Christian School for grades K-12. The faith of her parents became that of her own and she made profession of faith when she was in high school. When she graduated from high school she chose Dordt College to be the place to receive her B.A degree.

As many of you may have guessed, Dordt College was the location where the couple met. The two met during their freshmen year on a double date that was set-up by some mutual friends. Craig was set-up with Karen's room mate and Karen was set-up with Craig's close friend. There was no love connection on this date by any of the parties involved. Craig and Karen's paths really did not cross again until their Jr. year even though they were both education majors- Craig a physical education major and Karen and elementary education major.

Once their paths crossed again, Craig and Karen became very good friends. They spent a large amount of time together in group settings and at church. From the beginning of their friendship their mutual faith played a big part in their relationship. They often would hang out together discussing church issues- especially issues pertaining to the CRC denomination. Sometimes the articles Craig read in the "Banner" fueled these conversations. Craig also became Karen's chauffeur to church and over the next two years their friendship began to grow and on March 3, 1990 Craig and Karen went out on their first date. This first date was not like most first dates because the couple knew each other very well. They knew that marriage was a very good future possibility for them being as they were already best friends.

Graduation came first and then came marriage. After graduation in May of 1990, Craig and Karen both returned back to Dordt for another semester. Karen needed to finish up some student teaching and Craig wanted to get a minor in English. (They both really wanted more time together to date.) This time spent together confirmed to the couple that they wanted to be together beyond Dordt College and so on May 24, 1991 they were married in Everson, Washington.

Soon after the wedding, the couple moved to San Jose CA where they both taught for the next three years. Karen taught second grade at Milpitas Christian School and Craig taught k-8 PE and some Jr. High classes at San Jose Christian School. To the couple, those three years in sunny warm California were like a long honeymoon. A lot of their time was spent working, but there was still quite a bit of free time to explore the Bay Area. Many Saturday afternoons were spent relaxing on some sandy beach along the Pacific Ocean and every Sunday was spent attending a wonderful Orthodox Presbyterian church located not too far from the couple's apartment complex. The two things that were highlights of that church experience were the excellent expository preaching and the exposure to some new believers who had a passion for God's word.

San Jose, though nice, was much too expensive to become a permanent home for the couple. The couple also wanted to be nearer to family so they traded in the sunny skies of California for the cloudy skies of Washington. Mt. Vernon, WA became their new home, Mt. Vernon Christian School became their new place of employment, and MV 1st CRC became the couple's new church home. Karen taught for two more years and then resigned from teaching (in a school environment) to become a full time mom. Much to the couples joy Joshua Alan was born on May 7, 1996. Craig continued to teach for the next seven years at MVCS during that time the family happily welcomed Joel William on July 16, 2000.

The summer that Joel was born was also the summer that Craig began his Master's degree. The next two years were busy for Craig with full time teaching, coaching, serving as a deacon, and taking classes part-time. (During these two years, Craig also put an addition on the family's home in his "spare time". This hobby of home additions/renovations is a "spare time" activity that continues to this day.) These were busy years for Karen too as she began home schooling Josh as well as taking care of an active toddler.

In January 2002, Craig's mom, Sandy, was diagnosed with terminal lung cancer. This was a very difficult time for the family. Up until this point, they had never really experience a truly difficult situation before. They were aware of God's goodness and grace during these years of ease. They knew, even during the good times, that most likely there would be some hard times ahead-how could there not be when you are living in a fallen world? They were aware of God's goodness and his grace in the hard times too and they were able to say good bye to Craig's mom nine months later knowing that they would one day be reunited in heaven because of what Christ had done for them on Calvary's cross.

Soon after Craig's mom passed away Craig completed his Master's degree and he then decided that he wanted to get his Doctorate. (This news was a little surprising to Karen.) The couple decided that the best way to accomplish this goal would be for the family to move to the mid-west. A move to the mid-west would allow Craig to go to school full-time and allow Karen to remain a full-time mom and home educator. Craig was offered an assistantship at the University of South Dakota and the couple sold their house in Mt. Vernon, WA and purchased a home in Viborg, SD. Home renovation was a large part of the Viborg experience. Even the young Heynen boys were given a paint brush and were put to work.

Craig's dad, Gary, was diagnosed with advance kidney cancer soon after the couple moved to Viborg. Karen's brother's wife, Lisa, had also been diagnosed with cancer just a few months before this. Once again this was a difficult time for the couple, yet they couldn't help giving thanks to God for in His good providence He allowed them to move to the mid-west and they were able to spend much time with Gary in the last remaining months of his life. Gary and Lisa died two days apart from each other in July, 2004. Once again the couple felt joy mixed with their grief for they knew that they served a risen Savior and through the pain of cancer and death they began viewing life with an eternal perspective. Over the next few months death touched the couple's lives a few more times as God called three of their grandparents home to glory. But God was also merciful during this time and He blessed the family with the gift of life for on May 11, 2005 Anna Christine joined the home! The name Anna Christine means "God has been gracious". God is indeed gracious for He grants life in death through his only son, Jesus- Our Lord!

After Craig's dad's death, the family sold their home in Viborg, SD and moved to the family century farm where they continue to live to this day. Craig was offered a job at the University of South Dakota in 2005 after the completion of his Ed. Doctorate degree in Curriculum and Instruction. He taught in the USD Education Department until Dordt College offered him a job in 2007 and this is where he currently is employed as the Head Track and Field Coach and as a professor in the HHP department.

Karen continues to home school both Joel (grade 6) and Anna (grade 2), as well as being a full time home maker. Josh is currently a Jr. at Unity Christian High School. The Lord has greatly blessed the family over the past many years of their lives and they can say whole heartedly with the Psalmist, "Great is the LORD, and greatly to be praised, and his greatness is unsearchable." (Psalm 145:3)

Our Trip of a Lifetime to the Netherlands By Herm



Honorary resident of the Netherlands Cheryl and I flew out of Sioux Falls to Minneapolis and on to Amsterdam on the 8th of April. We stayed for two weeks with my first cousin, Ron and (Leny), who have lived in the North Holland province most of their lives, in the city of Huizen, just east of Amsterdam. They took two weeks of vacation just to take us around, and we thought that was very special of them to do that for us. It was quite the experience. They live in an apartment type of home that has two stories, plus a usable attic and cellar. Their home is only about 30' wide and the same with the back yard. Everything is small and crowded. There are bicycles everywhere, and every street has its own bike trail, sometimes on both sides. The bike trails have a different color brick than the brick that is on the main road. There are no stop signs, just round-abouts and raised intersections to slow traffic down. Bikes and pedestrians have the right of way. I had my directions turned around the whole time I was there, because there are no straight north, south, east and west roads; it's all curves and slanted roads because of all the canals everywhere.

The first thing we went to go see was Noah's Ark by Dordrecht. We also sailed Gooimeer Lake, took the covered water bus through the canals in Amsterdam, went to the coast of the North Sea and drove over the dam they built to reclaim the land from the sea. We toured a 3 story, 400 year old secret Catholic Church that was hidden in a house in the middle of town, and only a few knew of it! We toured some windmills and saw what each one did - sawmill, paint mill, flour and spice mills - no wind, no work! We also went to Keukenhof to see the LARGE garden of flowers, maybe 50 acres or so! They have many kinds of tulips and other flowers mixed in all sorts of shapes and paths winding through the trees and canals. It was very, very beautiful, with all kinds displayed throughout the gardens. After the gardens we went to a flower parade. There were over 50 huge floats made of fresh flowers. What an aroma that was! The open markets they have every weekend in their town was neat to see and fun to shop, also. And, of course, we observed the different kinds of garbage trucks! We took over 250 pictures on our trip!

We also found out that my great grandpa Rozeboom, who died in 1968, immigrated to America exactly 100 years ago, in February of 1913,

because of the threat of World War 1. I have documents of 10 generations of the Rozeboom's, all the way back to 1665. A large family of boys back in the 1800's changed the spelling of their last name by adding an extra o, n, or by changing the z to an s. I guess they did this so they could keep their families apart and to help keep track of who belonged to whom.

I mentioned earlier that we went to see Noah's Ark. This is a story all it's own. It's located south of Amsterdam. Johan Huibers first built a smaller version and is sailing all over Europe. The full size (450') ark just opened last summer. It is too large to sail the canals. We spent 4 hours looking through it. We bought the book he wrote and it is a very inspiring life story of Johan. His work ethics are very commendable. Some comments made inside the cover of the book: "Johan is an example to all who want to discover God's plan for their life and fulfill it. Nothing is impossible...This is one of the most remarkable stories of our lifetime. No one believed that Johan would be the first man since Noah to succeed in building the ark. But this book isn't only about Johan. Ultimately, this book is about

your dream. So be warned: The message contained in this book could change your life for good." This book can be found on the website

www.arkofnoah.org. The site also has some short videos about the ark. Cheryl and I very much recommend everyone to read this book and go see the ark if possible. We will make our copy available because we both have read it on our vacation. Once you get started reading it, you can't lay it down. I also hope to read it again sometime.



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

1 c. brown sugar	1 tsp. almond flavoring
1 c. oleo	1 tsp. baking soda
1 c. oil	3 1/2 to 4 c. flour
1 egg	1 pkg. white choc. chips
1 T. milk	1/2 pkg. toffee bits
1 tsp. cream of tartar	

Mix in order given. Drop on cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 12-14 minutes.

1 lb ground beef

1/2 lb sausage (I use 1 1/2 lb hamburger, no sausage) Onion to taste

- 1 15 oz container ricotta cheese **or** small curd cottage cheese
- 1/2 cup Parmesan cheese
- 1/4 tsp garlic powder (I omit garlic)

Pepper to taste

3 c shredded mozzarella cheese

1 26 oz spaghetti sauce

1/3 c water

1 8 oz package of sliced mushrooms

8 uncooked lasagna noodles uncooked


Brown the hamburger/sausage with onion, drain well. Combine ricotta cheese, parmesan cheese, pepper, garlic in bowl. Mix spaghetti sauce with water in separate bowl.

Spray bottom and sides of slow cooker well with nonstick spray.

Layer:

- 1. 4 noodles (broken in pieces to fit)
- 2. Spread 1/2 meat over noodles, 1/2 cheese mix, 1/2 mushrooms, 1/2 sauce
- 3. Spread 1/2 the mozzarella cheese on meat and cheese layer
- 4. Repeat layers with remaining ingredients

Cook on low for 4 hrs. Let stand 10 minutes and serve. Cook only 4 hours or lasagna may burn.
